Program Note: *Contemplations* (21, 22) was commissioned by the Radcliffe Choral Society for its 2005–6 season. The main body of the text consists of two verses excerpted from a longer poem by 17th-century American poet Anne Bradstreet, a Puritan with close connections to Harvard. The phrase “O happy Flood” is linked to Psalm 98, “Let the floods clap their hands,” in both Latin and English. Water images—stream, river, ocean, flood—shape the composition as each recitative-style “contemplation” concludes with a freer “out-pouring.”


